Over the years, we have come a long way from those humble beginnings. What started as a modest 6-bed home has grown into a thriving residential community, adapting, and expanding to meet the changing needs of the children and young adults we support.

In 2008 we ventured into adult services, and this marked the year, we opened our first adult service. In 2014, we took a significant step forward by opening a second children's home. This expansion marked an important milestone, enabling us to extend our support to even more children and young people in need.

We have invested in our facilities, broadened our services, and developed a team of dedicated professionals who share our passion for delivering high-quality care.

We remain proud of our journey and take great pride in the incredible progress made by the children and young people in our care.

MY STORY

VICKIE'S STORY

In 2005, Vickie moved from another care home to Footsteps Care. Vickie felt the support from Footsteps was a great help in gaining her independence. "You can ask Jo," she laughs, "from day one I always wanted my independence, to do things for myself." Vickie shared that the care she received at Footsteps, "makes you feel like you're their own family."

When asked about some favourite memories, Vickie shared about a trip to Disneyland Florida. "We stayed in a villa with a pool. I remember there was a lizard near the pool and Jo was saying how its eyes were popping out. It was so funny." Vickie continued, "We got to go on rides like the Back to the Future ride. And the funniest time was when Chris was doing a funny dance and Jo was saying, "Footsteps Crew!"

When Vickie turned 18 in 2006, she left Footsteps Care to go into supported living. She liked the freedom this gave her and felt ready to live independently when she left supported living. Since then, Vikie has gotten married to Trevor, who she met over social media, but knew through his brother, whom she went to college with. The happy couple have a little girl called Amy. She is four years old now and going to school. Vickie says, "I love being a mum and getting to interact with her. My favourite thing to do with Amy is to take her to soft play."

Vickie is now working with Age UK, supporting lonely residents who become isolated. She calls them on a regular basis to connect and provide emotional support. When asked if there was anything she would like to share, Vickie said, "I would like to say thank you to Jo and Chris for making me more independent. Thank you." Through her experiences, Vickie has embraced her independence and found a way to impact the lives of others positively. Thank you, Vickie, for sharing your inspiring story.

CLAIRE'S STORY

I came to Footsteps when the foster carer said they couldn't look after me anymore because of my behaviour. Everything was going wrong for me. I felt scared because I didn't know where I was going or what would happen.

When I first walked into Footsteps, I was scared. The staff were so nice and kind, but I thought it might be a trick because they were being nice, but it wasn't. I had a lovely bedroom, and they let me decorate it however I wanted. It was my room, and I could choose whatever I liked. I remember buying a pink lamp with a matching rug and curtains. I'll never forget that.

I remember one day, I went shopping. I bought loads of stuff, and Jo and I had a long talk about things. We had dinner at a restaurant and then went roller skating all night. It was the best day, and I still have the photo. Jo was the manager, and she didn't have to take us out, but she did, she could have left it to the staff. She helped me get into school. I was always in trouble at school. Jo had loads of meetings with the headteacher.

She was always with the head teacher because of me, but they never expelled me. I wrote a card to the school three Christmases ago to say sorry. I got a lovely letter back from the head teacher. He was nice.

I liked the other children I lived with. We were a family. There were not loads of kids coming and going, it was just us. What I liked best at Footsteps was it was a family. We all had dinner together at the table every night, and the meals were lovely. We talked about our day. Saturday nights were fun. We had treats, watched The X Factor with our blankets and PJs, and played on the PlayStation. Sundays were fun too. The house would smell of breakfast. Gemma used to cook breakfast on the weekends, and I can still remember that smell. She was the best cook and really spoiled us.

At Footsteps, I felt safe. When I got sad, the staff cared. They were my family, and I loved it there. I still remember sitting on the brown box in the garden under the window.

Christmas was so good. I got loads of presents, and even though Vicky told me they were from Father Christmas, I knew it was the staff. One Christmas, we stayed up late, ordered takeaway, and Vicky took us to see a panto.

I went to church at Christmas with Jo and we sang carols. She got emotional and I told her she was embarrassing me, and we both could not stop laughing. I thought we were going to get thrown out. She laughs really loud, and it makes you laugh. I still laugh when I think about that night.

The one thing I would like to say to the staff at Footsteps is thank you all so much. I'm sorry for my behaviour. I've changed a lot. I live independently and have been working at my job for three years. I'm very happy. To the children, I would say you are lucky to be there.

REMEEZ'S STORY

At first, Remeez's time at Footsteps Care may have felt a bit rocky, but he settled in. Overall, his experience was positive, as he had the opportunity to try new things, like attending his first festival and going on his first holiday. These were big milestones in his journey. He also enjoyed tasting different cultural foods that he hadn't experienced before. He particularly enjoyed African cuisine.

The activities offered at Footsteps was a highlight of Remeez's stay. He appreciated having the freedom to choose where to go.

The best part of his experience was the relationships he built with the supportive staff members, including Michael GB, Michelle, John, Nafisa, Sabrina, Hasara, Shamus, Festus, Felicia, Catchy, and Abdul. These staff members were kind.

Among his favourite memories might be the Butlin's holidays and his leaving meal and party. Remeez found that most of the staff were encouraging and supportive, allowing him to follow his interests and ask questions. "Footsteps is dedicated to helping you do what you love, so be sure to participate in as many activities as possible!"

Some of Will's favourite memories are dancing and scaring people at the Brentwood Halloween party and enjoying Andy's delicious Christmas dinners. Andy also taught Will how to cook, which he hadn't done before. Now, Will sometimes cooks pasta bake or Bolognese with mushrooms for others in the home.

Will has a great sense of humour too. He loves giving staff funny nicknames, like calling Cathy 'Naggy-Grinch.' He jokes that the best way to stop her from nagging is to give her chocolate. Thanks for the tip, Will! We love having him here at Footsteps.

OLA'S STORY

Ola has been part of Footsteps since 2014, and one of his favourite things to do is go out and meet new people. He loves socializing and exploring new places, which has helped him make friends and feel more confident.

Cathy has been a big support for Ola in the home. He says she's always there to encourage him, cheer him on, and help him when he needs it. With Andy's help, Cathy even supported Ola in making his CV, which made him feel proud of his achievements.

Ola's favourite memory is when he came back from Goodmayes Hospital. He was really worried he wouldn't be allowed to return, but when he did, it felt like coming home to his family. That moment meant a lot to him, and we're so happy he's here with us!



CDK'S STORY

At Footsteps, the young person has had so much fun! He explains that Michelle always tells the best jokes and makes everyone laugh and that Laura is the best cook ever; every meal she makes is delicious, and everyone loves trying all the different foods she prepares.

One of his favourite memories is when they went to Winter Wonderland. He said "It was amazing!

The young person thinks Footsteps is a really nice place where everyone is friendly and kind. Since arriving, he has learned many new skills, such as doing his own laundry and washing his plate after eating.

WHO IS JO?

As you can see from the memories shared by some of our young people, one staff member who has had an impact on the life of numerous children is Jo. Jo has been part of the Footsteps family for 19 years, spending a majority of that time as the Ofsted registered manager of the children's service, before becoming area manager. Throughout this time, she has witnessed many changes and played a role in supporting and guiding children and young people through their unique journeys. We asked Jo to share a few words on her experience.

"Hmmm, I'm not quite sure where to begin. It has certainly been an eventful 19 years and has been the most amazing adventure. I have had the absolute pleasure of working alongside some of the kindest, most caring, and dedicated staff you could ever wish to meet. These are people who have gone above and beyond to better the lives of vulnerable children and young people, and it's been a privilege to be part of these teams. I have been blessed to work with deeply caring colleagues who dedicate their time and efforts to better the lives of our children and young people.

The memories I've made here are ones I will always cherish. It really is like being part of one large family.
